Right-touch Regulation: applying principles in practice in different regulatory environments

Biography:

Mr. Harry Cayton, OBE is chief executive of the Professional Standards Authority for Health and Social Care, the statutory body which oversees the regulation and registration of health and care professions in the UK. From 2001-2007 he was National Director for Patients & the Public at the Department of Health following 20 years in the voluntary sector, latterly as chief executive of the Alzheimer's Society. He is member of the World Economic Forum Council on Digital Health, chair of the Commission on Human Medicines, Patient &Public Involvement Advisory Group, a trustee of Comic Relief, and advisor to several charities.

Abstract:

Right-touch regulation is an approach developed by the Professional Standards Authority in the UK. It is based on the principle that effective regulation should use only the regulatory force necessary to

achieve the desired effect; that regulation should be transparent, targeted and proportionate.

Right-touch regulation has eight tests that should be applied in each situation when regulation is considered. Drawing on the international work of the Authority, Mr. Cayton will describe right-touch regulation and how it can be applied in different situations to improve the effectiveness of regulation and to promote quality and patient safety.
